In addition to the standard nursery admissions criteria (as detailed on page 4 and 5) criteria for admission to the 30 hours Nursery provision are:

- Able to accept, with valid eligibility code, a place for 30 hours per week (8:30 am to 2:30 pm) Monday to Friday at Ewell Grove Nursery (term time only).
- Able to accept, but awaiting a valid eligibility code, a place for 30 hours per week (8:30 am to 2:30 pm) Monday to Friday at Ewell Grove Nursery (term time only). NB once a 30-hour place has been offered - it will not be confirmed formally until a valid eligibility code has been provided to the School by the parent/carer.
- Ineligible for 30 hours extended entitlement but willing to self-fund the additional 15 hours per week at a rate of £7.00 per hour or £105 per week.

Please note this charge is subject to change at any point.

 If a child becomes ineligible for the free extended entitlement during the year and parents/carers cannot produce an eligibility code, the child will remain entitled to the 15-hour universal provision, which will be available between 12:30 pm to 3:30 pm Monday to Friday.



Admission is dependent on a Ewell Grove application being submitted within the publicised timescale and places being available. All application forms must be returned by 15th January the academic year prior to starting in September. After the closing date, applications for entry to Ewell Grove Nursery in the academic year 2024/25 will always be ranked according to the following criteria:

PRIORITY A – LOOKED AFTER AND PREVIOUSLY LOOKED AFTER CHILDREN

Children who are or have previously been registered as being in the care of a local authority for example:

- fostered or living in a children's home
- adoption
- a special guardianship order
- a child arrangements order (previously known as a residence order)
- who has been in local-authority care for 1 day or more

PRIORITY B - EDUCATION HEALTH CARE PLAN OR SOCIAL NEED FOR A PLACE AT EWELL GROVE

Places will be allocated to children with an Education Health Care Plan (EHCP) or where written evidence can be provided that formal assessment for an EHCP has been agreed by a Local Authority. Places will also be allocated to children with social need; these will be assessed against the information either provided directly to or gained by the school from professional agencies working with the family. Examples of social need which may be considered (in no specific order) might include:

- If a parent is in receipt of any of the benefits that qualifies the school to claim 'Early Years or Pupil Premium'
- A child living in temporary/overcrowded accommodation with a confined play space (those living in a bedsit, top floor flat, hostel, caravan, mobile home or children with no garden); evidence from housing department will be required
- A child with a parent living in accommodation protecting them from domestic violence
- A child of parents with disabilities or a child who has siblings with disabilities
- A child who is cared for by a 'Young Carer'

PRIORITY C – CHILDREN OF A MEMBER OF STAFF

PRIORITY D – WHERE A CHILD IS EXPECTED TO HAVE A SIBLING ATTENDING EWELL GROVE AT THE TIME OF ADMISSION

A sibling is a child who will have a brother or sister (including children living as siblings within the same family unit) attending Ewell Grove Primary and Nursery School at the time of the sibling's admission.

Priority E – Children who will turn 4 years old between 1^{st} September 2024 and 31^{st} August 2025

This is to give priority to older children who will be due to transfer to Reception in September **2025** and hence have only one year left to attend nursery.

If parents believe that their child is eligible under any of these categories supporting evidence must be included with the application form. Evidence submitted to the school after the 15th January will not be accepted.

FOR THE SPRING AND SUMMER TERM ADMISSIONS (WHERE AFTERNOON VACANCIES ARE AVAILABLE ONLY):

PRIORITY F

In circumstances where there are vacant places in our Afternoon Nursery Class, and after priorities have been given using criteria A to D, children who have had their 3rd birthday and have applied to Ewell Grove Nursery for September 2025 will be able to benefit from additional nursery experience as follows:

If your child is born between:	Children at Ewell Grove are eligible for up to 30 hours free early education in the term following their third birthday		
1st September – 31st December 2021	Spring Term 2025		
1st January – 31st March 2022	Summer Term 2025		
1st April – 31st August 2022	Autumn Term 2025		

Where any category of priority is oversubscribed applicants will be ranked according to the straight line distance from the address they provide on the Application Form to the School. Ewell Grove will use the Admissions and Transport Team's Geographical Information System. The measurement for these purposes does not take into account the mode of transport used. The distance is measured from the address point of the pupil's house as set by Ordnance Survey to the nearest gate available for pupils to use.

NB – the priority criteria outlined in this document will only be used for the purpose of allocating a place at Ewell Grove Nursery. The criteria are not used for the purpose of the allocation of morning/afternoon sessions. Parents are given an opportunity to express a preference for morning/afternoon sessions on their application form, but these cannot be guaranteed. The final decision with regard to the admission of Nursery places and the allocation of morning/afternoon sessions rests with the Governing Board of the School. Where Ewell Grove Nursery is oversubscribed we will maintain a waiting list and offer places from this in accordance with the criteria above.

Admission to Ewell Grove Nursery does not guarantee admission to our Reception classes. Applications for Reception must be made via Surrey County Council and be submitted by the statutory deadline in order to be considered.

Although children are not of statutory school age until the term after their 5th birthday, we believe that the precedent for attendance of our Nursery children should be in line with the rest of the school. Upon becoming statutory school age, any attendance rate under 95% will be automatically highlighted to the Inclusion Officer and must be closely monitored by the School. Please ensure you familiarise yourself with our school Attendance Policy that includes our nursery classes.



EWELL GROVE NURSERY LUNCH CLUB

Nursery Lunch Club operates for both nursery classes between 11:30 am -12:30pm. Nursery Lunch Club is in addition to the 15-hour free entitlement offers, providing parents with the option of provision for a further 5 hours per week. Places are subject to availability after provision for those children eligible for 30-hours' has been organised – remaining places are offered on a first come, first served basis. If all 30 hour places are filled there are 13 additional places for 15 hour children. Parents are required to provide their child with a packed lunch (Ewell Grove will provide water). Please note that nursery-aged children are not eligible for Universal Free School Meals.

There will be a charge of £7.00 per Lunch Club session to attend; this offers parents up to five further hours of supervision a week for £35.00. *Please note this charge is subject to change at any point.* This charge is not applicable to any child eligible for 30-hours' provision. Parents of children that qualify and register for Early Years Pupil Premium will receive a 50% reduction on this cost; the remainder will be covered by the additional Early Years Pupil Premium funding paid to the school. The sessional charge for Nursery Lunch Club will be reviewed annually by the Governing Board. No funds from Ewell Grove's delegated budget or School Fund will be used to subsidise the overall running costs of this service.

ADDITIONAL HOURS

Parents/carers may request to extend the daily provision of the 30-hours' childcare schemes from 2:30 pm until 3:30pm. There will be a charge of £7.00 per Extension Hour to attend; this offers parents up to five further hours of supervision a week for £35.00. *Please note this charge is subject to change at any point*. Both Nursery Lunch Club and the Extension Hours are provided as a flexible arrangement giving parents the choice of which days to attend. However, sessions must be arranged with Ewell Grove and paid for in advance by the date advised. Ewell Grove will not refund a session payment that a parent has booked, but chosen or been unable to use – this includes if a child is absent. A session payment cannot be 'carried over' in lieu of a session missed for any reason. Nursery Lunch Club and Extension Hours arrangements will be cancelled if notification and payments are not in line with those outlined in this policy. Payment cannot be made retrospectively.

We understand that events can occur that require parents to find unexpected cover for their child over the Lunch Club period of 11:30 am to 12:30 pm, or the Extension Hours period of 2:30 pm to 3:30 pm. If a place has not been booked in advance, parent can always enquire if one is available at short notice. Ewell Grove will always seek to support a family in these unavoidable circumstances if able to do so.

PAYMENT METHODS

Payment for Nursery Lunch Club and Extension Hours should be made online through 'Tucasi'; the link for this can be found on the school website <u>https://www.scopay.com/ewell-grove</u>. In order to make your payment you will need to set up an account and enter an 'online link code'. This personal code will be sent home with your child during their first week at Nursery.



Family are the most important people in a child's life. We recognise the individual insight you bring with your child and endeavour to work closely with families at all times. We see starting at Ewell Grove Nursery as a continuation of the learning experience that your child has already begun at home with you.

Our aim is to settle your child as easily and quickly as possible, but it will be a different experience for every unique child. Once offered a place you will be invited to, and we would strongly recommend you accept, a programme of induction events. In the meantime, we understand that both you and your child are bound to be wondering what happens at nursery each day.

Learning at our nursery will include:

- Leaving our main carers happily and making new friends
- Understanding that within a class I have to think about other people and not just what I want!
- Learning to be independent in my learning, behaviour and toileting; between 30-50 months most children should be able to remember to go to the toilet in time and wipe themselves. This approach will be supported in nursery... but help will always be on hand.
- Indoor and outdoor independent learning across all 7 areas of Early Years learning
- S prime areas Personal, Social and Emotional Development, Physical Development & communication and Language.
- > 4 specific areas Literacy, Mathematics, Understanding the World, Expressive Arts and Design
- Thinking and reasoning creatively and critically
- Adult facilitated activities
- Fruit, milk and/or water
- Group time such as story-telling, developing phonics and listening games





We are often asked how families can prepare their chid for nursery... here are some of the things you can practise:

PREPARING FOR NURSERY

The Start of Independence

- Teach your child to use the toilet (and urinal) independently; this will improve their self-esteem when they are at school with their peers
- Ensure they can dress themselves and put on their own coat
- Encourage them to carry their own bag to school
- Be confident when dropping them off at school; don't let them 'cling' to you at the school gate
- Encourage them to become a 'playground friend' or 'school buddy'
- Support them to hang up their school uniform ready for the next day
- Include them when completing household tasks

EMOTIONAL WELLBEING

Relationships

- Tell your child that you love them every day
- It's good to establish and maintain boundaries with your child it helps them to feel safe
- Be a positive role model for your child don't shout or swear in front of them, it is rarely effective

Raising Self-Esteem

- When things are difficult help your child to see it as part of life and learning and that it happens to all of us
- Teach your child not to give up and to keep trying
- Listen to your child and show them you value their views and opinions

Spending Time Together

You can help your child if you:

- Set aside time for talking without being interrupted by phones, TV, radio, computer etc.
- Share books and games in a quiet environment not in front of the television
- Play games together as a family that encourage concentration, such as jigsaws and board games
- Encourage physical play and exercise by taking a trip to the park or the local leisure centre
- Give lots of hugs and praise

Getting Enough Sleep

- Children need sleep to develop, to concentrate in school and to learn well
- Under fives need up to 15 hours, primary children about 10 hours and even older children still need 9 hours
- Too many late bedtimes can make it hard for them to learn
- A good night's rest will help your child feel happy all day long

Behaving Well

- Agree clear and realistic rules and stick to them
- Encourage your child to always say 'please' and 'thank you' and not to interrupt you or others when you are talking
- Support school rules and encourage your child to follow these
- Ask for help if you child's behaviour is proving difficult at home



All children are expected to wear school uniform. The wearing of school uniform encourages children to take a pride in themselves and their school and the Governors of Ewell Grove would appreciate parents' support. IMPORTANCE OF PROVIDING SCHOOL WITH ALL THE INFORMATION NEEDED BEFORE YOUR CHILD STARTS

It is very important that you complete all the forms included in your admission pack and return them to school before your child starts. The information you provide will inform our planning for the first weeks and helps us to ensure that children are safe and happy when they start Nursery. We cannot have a child on site without emergency contact information.

PARENTMAIL

We are using a service called ParentMail which enables the school to email letters and messages direct to parents effectively and efficiently.

In order for you to benefit from ParentMail please complete the Admission Form with details of your email address (1 per parent/carer). Please ensure the address is written clearly.

Once your child is 'on roll' at Ewell Grove you will receive a registration invitation email from ParentMail with full instructions to follow in order to verify your account.

Add <u>info@parentmail.co.uk</u> to your contacts/address book in your email account to make it a "safe sender". Please be assured that ParentMail is registered with the Information Commissioner and <u>guarantees</u> that all information you provide will be kept private and will not be passed on to any other organisation.

TUCASI

Tucasi is a secure online payment service that allows parents to make payments to the school using their debit or credit cards.

MEDICAL NEEDS

If your child has an ongoing medical condition, for which they take medication outside of school hours please inform the School Office.

Nursery, Reception, Year 1 & 2 are offered fruit daily to promote healthy eating. Please inform us of any fruit allergies.

ACTIVITY FUND

Parents at Ewell Grove are asked to make an annual one-off payment of £15.00 into our Activity Fund. Over the academic year all our children take part in various activities that supplement the basic curriculum. In the past this has included visits from companies staging puppet, dance and drama performances, as well as science activities for the children to observe over a period of time, such as egg hatching. We are also very keen to continue offering the opportunity for children to undertake projects involving, for example, cooking and sewing.

The costs relating to the experiences we would like to provide amount to **£15** per child (Please contact the School Office if you will have difficulty making this payment in one instalment).

Assuming that we receive enough contributions we aim to provide the following:

- Two additional educational activities e.g. puppet show, drama production
- Two Science based activities e.g. egg hatching, butterfly lifecycle, mobile planetarium
- Projects through the year e.g. art, baking, sewing, construction

We have already booked a theatre company to visit in January which will be paid for by these contributions, however, if we receive insufficient contributions we will be unable to continue with the planned programme of activities.

Please note that this contribution does NOT include any educational visits

Payments should be made through <u>Tucasi</u>, which you will find on the School website at the bottom of the home page.

In order to make your payment you will need to set up an account and enter an 'online link code'. This personal code will be sent home with your child sometime in September.

If you require the use of a computer, you will have the opportunity to contact the School Office and arrange a suitable time to come in and process your contribution in school. Manual systems will also be maintained in the event that you are unable use this system, however, please note that we no longer accept cheques and we aim to keep cash holding to a minimum. Please contact the School Office if you require assistance.


